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RUC temporary discount announced by Transport Minister Michael Wood

Purpose

The purpose of this Advisory is to update Advisory KA-07 Temporary RUC reduction proposal discussions, released 16 March 2022.

Update

Yesterday Transport Minister Michael Wood advised <u>here</u> that from late April to late July 2022, road user charges (RUC) will be cut by 36 percent across all legislated rates.

The impact

Since the Government's announcement on 14 March to discount fuel by 25c per litre, we have had multiple discussions with officials on how the freight sector would get similar relief. Our initial analysis indicated our members would receive greater benefits if RUC could be used, rather than the discount occurring at the pump, and we have been working collaboratively with officials. We also alerted Waka Kotahi New Zealand Transport Agency to the issue that operators that have off-road equipment, plant and machinery which does not pay RUC will not benefit form this approach.

As we expected, the benefit to reducing operating costs in terms of cents per kilometre is greater and this is demonstrated in Table 1, below, that compares the level of discount on a cents per kilometre basis between a 36% RUC reduction and a 25 cent per litre reduction in the price of diesel.

Officials have still not determined the process for the RUC discount and what operators will need to do access it. We will continue to collaborate with officials on this and update you when substantial progress has been made.

What operators need to do

As with managing a change to any price input to transport rates, we urge operators to start considering how they will manage the upcoming change both when it is implemented and when normal rates return with their customers.

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
